Transmission line easements

Electric transmission lines carry large amounts of electricity over long distances. EKPC maintains nearly 2,900 miles of transmission lines in Kentucky.

I did not agree to an easement; where did it come from?

Most likely, a previous owner of the property agreed to it. Easement rights typically last forever and transfer with land ownership. A title search or land survey should identify any existing electric transmission easements.

Getting a copy of the easement for your property

Easements are recorded with the County Clerk where the property is located. One easement could address multiple properties due to subsequent subdividing. If you have difficulty finding the easement for your property, contact EKPC with the structure number and we will assist.

Electric transmission lines on your property

Easement – Legal agreement defining and transferring land rights necessary for EKPC to build, operate and maintain transmission facilities.

Right-of-way – The portion of property around transmission lines and facilities for which EKPC has purchased an easement. EKPC does not own this property but has rights to locate its poles and wires there and to enter the property to maintain its facilities.

What may be prohibited in the right-of-way?

- Adding or expanding any portion of structures such as houses, barns, sheds and swimming pools.
- Raising the elevation of the ground surface, even temporarily.
- Digging near support structures like poles, towers, anchoring guys, etc.
- Cutting/logging trees that could fall into or near wires or structures.
- Piling material, even temporarily
